

"Challenges are what make life interesting. Overcoming them is what makes life meaningful."



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


Prof. (Dr.) H. P. Singh, VSM




ICFAI Law School celebrated a splendid Navratri Celebration, on the

The Constitutional And Institutional Framework Of **Human Rights In India**

The constitution of India provides numerous rights which are called "fundamental rights. The expression "fundamental rights" denotes that these rights are inherent in all human beings and they are required for blossoming of the human personality and soul. These rights have been given a superior place of pride in the Constitution. These rights are therefore necessary to protect the dignity of individual and to create conditions in which a person can develop to the fullest extent. The judicially enforceable fundamental right which comprises all seminal civil and political rights and some of the rights of minorities are enshrined in part III of the Constitution (Articles 12 to 35). These include the right to equality, the right to freedom, the right against exploitation, the right to freedom of religion, cultural and educational rights and the right to Constitutional remedies. The Fundamental rights differ from ordinary rights in the sense that the former are uninfringeable. No law, ordinance, custom, usage, or administrative order can abridge or take them away. Any law, which is violating of any of the fundamental right, is void.

In ADM Jabalpur v. Shukla, Justice Beg observed:

"the object of making certain general aspects of rights fundamental is to guarantee them against illegal invasion of these rights by executive, legislative, or judicial organ of the State."


Earlier, Chief Justice SubbaRao in **Golak Nath v. State of Punjab**² had rightly observed, "Fundamental rights are the modern name for what have been traditionally known as natural rights." The Supreme Court of India recognizes these fundamental rights as 'Natural Rights' or 'Human Rights'. While referring to the fundamental rights contained in Part III of the Constitution, Sikri, the then Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, in **Keshavananda Bharati v. State of Kerala**, observed:

"I am unable to hold these provisions to show that rights are not natural or inalienable rights. As a matter of fact India was a party to the Universal Declaration of Rights....and that Declaration describes some fundamental rights as inalienable."

Institutional Framework and Human Rights

India is divided into twenty nine ⁴ States and seven Union (centrally administered) territories. The Constitution provides for division of legislative functions between Parliament and the State Legislatures. **97** items are placed under Parliament, **66** items are allocated for State Legislatures and **47** are made subject to concurrent jurisdiction of both, with the power of Parliament overriding in case of overlapping legislation (Article 246 and the seventh Schedule of the Constitution). Parliament case of overlapping legislation (Article 246 and the seventh Schedule of the Constitution). Parliament has power to make laws, inter lia, on preventive detention (Item 9. Union List, and item 3, Concurrent list), offences against laws in respect of any matter in the Union List (Item 93), and any matter not enumerated in any of the three lists (Item 97 and Article 248). Public order (Item 1), prisons and reformatories (Item 3), relief to the disabled and the unemployed (Item 9), and industries other than those declared by Union Legislature to be controlled by the Union (Item 24) are among the items in the State List. The Police is a State subject (Item 2), whereas deployment of any armed forces of the Union or any other force under the control of the Union is in the Union List (Item 2-A). Criminal law and procedure (Items 1 and 2), preventive detention for reasons connected with the security of the State, the maintenance of public order, or the maintenance of essential supplies and services (Item 3), transfer of prisoners (Item 4), actionable wrongs, civil procedure (Item 13), economic and social planning (Item 20), labor matters (Items 22, 23 and 24), education (Item 25), and factories (Item 36) are in the Concurrent List. Further, Article 253 empowers parliament to make laws for implementation of any treaty, notwithstanding the above distribution of legislative powers.

A deep analysis of the Fundamental Rights and the Directive Principles make it amply clear that between Constitution and its implications, almost the entire field of the universal declaration of human rights are covered. Besides, the Indian Constitution, through these two parts (Part III and IV) has made a novel attempt to balance between enforceable rights and non-enforceable rights, allowing them to complement each other on the fundamental governance of the country. Finally, both these rights are inter-related and indispensable for the nourishment of others.

SUPREME COURT'S SUO-MOTU COGNIZANCE OF MIGRANT CRISIS OF 2020

INTRODUCTION

The eye of the faith is always kept on Judiciary by the people and the same is restored by this organ of the state when a three-judge Bench of the Supreme Court on May 26 took Suo motu insight of the "issues and tragedies" looked by migrants following the nationwide lockdown pronounced on March 22, 2020, to curb the corona outbreak and said there have been "insufficiencies and certain lapses" with respect to the Central and State governments to deal with the migrant crisis during the lockdown. The court issued an order to the Center and the States to promptly provide transport, food and haven liberated from cost to the stranded migrant workers.

The suo motu cognizance of media reports and portrayals from senior lawyers or dignitaries from legal fraternity to step in to protect the fundamental rights of the migrant workers was taken into consideration by the judges in their chambers. The bench has sought for a nitty gritty report from the Center, states and union territories to take up the issue for hearing and issue directions.

SIGNIFICANCE OF THIS DEVELOPMENT

The development drawn by the Apex court in form of the suo-motu cognizance in migrants' issue is remarkable which once again has affirmed that the Judiciary has a constant watch over the functioning of the govt. and could interfere validly for the well-being of the countrymen. This move of the Apex court was the hour of the need in order to protect the human rights of the migrants who were in critical situation and were not being aided by the govt. in cogent ways at all.

The suo-motu cognizance of the SC is significant to protect rights of the citizens and especially of the underprivileged class of people. This act of SC would surely put the govt. in an obligation to take necessary steps to provide transportation, food and other essentials to the migrants.

REASONING

SC has a focal duty to safeguards fundamental rights of the citizens of the country. migrants who were in the critical needy situation amidst the corona outbreak and country lockdown need to be aided by the union or state govt by taking necessary steps per contra no cogent steps were taken by the govt, which was sheer violation of their fundamental rights i.e. right to food. Although the Government of India and state governments have taken measures yet there have been inadequacies and certain lapses, as stated in the order passed by the Apex court in the said matter.

CONCLUSION

In the present situation of lockdown in the entire country, this section of the society needs succour and aid by the concerned Governments especially crucial steps need to be taken by the Government of India, State Governments/Union Territories in this critical situation to extend helping hand to these migrant labourers. The SC also received several letters and representations from different sections of society marking the critical issue of migrant labourers. The crises of migrant labourers are even persisting today with large sections still stranded on roads, highways, railway stations and State borders as acknowledged by the SC in its order.

In today's times, the judicial activism is the need of the hour to maintain the check and balance over the other organs of the state. The judiciary in the present scenario has led down a significant move by issuing the order to the union and state governments to provide essentials i.e. food, transports etc. to the migrant laboureres. But the moves by the courts in such emergent situations must be expedient and more quench as justice delayed is justice denied.
